The district earned three stars in Progress. This means that we are meeting state standards. It's important to note, however, that it is difficult for us to advance in the Progress category since we are already a high-performing district.

## ATHLETICS

#### SPORTS YEAR IN REVIEW

Our student-athletes had numerous successes throughout the 2022-2023 school year.



Our eighth grade football team finished the season with six wins and one loss and our seventh graders had the opportunity to gain valuable experience by competing in several games in preparation for their eighth grade season.



The volleyball teams had a fantastic season. Both the seventh and eighth grade teams ended with matching 15-4 records and the seventh grade team won the BVC championship.






#### **雲** Cross Country

The cross country teams continued to improve, with the boys finishing first at the BVC Invitational and the girls third.

#### Basketball

The girls' basketball teams showcased their skill with a 5-1 record for the seventh grade team and a 6-2 record in the BVC for the eighth grade team. The boys had a solid season on the court as well. The seventh graders finished as BVC runner-ups with a tough overtime loss in the championship game and the eighth grade team was named league champs.

The high school girl's basketball program gained a new head coach in Chad Lieb. He has been coaching for the past 20 years, the last 11 of which have been with L-B.











#### Wrestling

Our wrestlers hit the mat for a Blanchard Valley Conference (BVC) championship title and Gavin Gillig was the district champion at 215 pounds, advancing to state.



#### **Baseball**

The varsity baseball team was league champions.



#### **Track**

The junior high boys and girls track teams won BVC champion titles and Saiphone Kaedaeng, Parker Martien and Arabelle Kolan qualified for the state meet in pole vault. The junior high boys' 4x800 team also broke a 30-year school record with a new time of 9:30.

The varsity boys' track team was BVC and District champions. The team also had several state qualifiers including Stefan Kolan placing fourth in pole vault, Cason Doolittle placing eighth in the 400-meter dash, and Owen Wilkins placing seventh in the 110-meter hurdles and sixth in the 300-meter hurdles.

The girls' varsity track team was also BVC champions. Like the boys, they also had Division 2 state qualifiers. Well done to the 4x800-meter relay team of Riley Irwin, Kylie Recker, Emma Garmatter, and Madi Gaerke who made it to the state meet and Karis Willow, who placed third in the state in the high jump.

## ARTS ARTISTS IN TRAINING

Across grades K-12, **1,200** students displayed **2,000+** pieces of artwork at the Liberty-Benton Arts Festival in May.

Additionally, in the spring of 2023, 20 students in grades K-8 had artwork on display at the Findlay Art Walk at the Hancock County Library.





Students in grades K-4 also attended art classes weekly, where they explored multimedias including fibers, oil pastels, paints, chalks and sculpture. Students in fifth grade focused on drawing, weaving and ceramics.







## SERVICE AND LEADERSHIP





#### **Kids Care**

Liberty-Benton's fourth grade service club, Kids Care, worked on monthly projects throughout the year to give back to our school and community. Projects included a food drive, hosting a game at the school carnival, and showing appreciation to staff members.

Additionally, our Z-Club organized the annual Salvation Army Food Drive. Students and staff donated several hundred pounds of nonperishable food items.

### **High Schoolers Prepare for Future With Life Readiness Day**

Liberty-Benton High School held its first Life Readiness Day last April. There were three parts to the day: life skills, including 24 sessions on topics from banking and insurance to health and diet, stress management and car care; a summer job fair; and career talk sessions, featuring professionals from the health science, agriculture and natural resources, finance, arts, architecture and construction, information technology, and transportation industries.



































#### L-B Hosts Leadership Day

Students participated in Leadership Day, which involved playing team-building games like Human Knot, Blanket Volleyball and Marble Race and hearing from Scott Grant, who talked about the importance of personal branding.









## Students Explore Interests Through Action Teams

Throughout the 2022-2023 school year, students met each Thursday in 24 different Action Teams, which were centered around passion projects. Teams included the Green Machine, where students sought ways to make the school green and oversaw the recycling program; the Soaring Productions team, where students learned to use video equipment, and record and create videos; and the Nursing Home Outreach team, through which students connected with local nursing homes. Students were placed in Action Teams based on their top three choices.

## FINANCES

Liberty-Benton Local Schools is dedicated to sound fiscal management, and it shows! Ohio's public schools are funded primarily through two sources: state funding and local tax dollars. The state's Fair School Funding Plan is designed to fund schools based on a community's ability to pay. Despite the

plan not being fully funded to date, approximately 41% of our district's revenue comes from the state with local taxpayer dollars filling a large portion of the remaining gap at just over 56%.

We in turn place the majority of our revenue right back into the classroom. Our largest expenditures are our staff, purchased services, such as technology, special education services, and mental health supports, and supplies and equipment.

ESSER, or COVID-19 federal relief funds, also continued to spur our progress during the 2022-2023 school year. The third round of this funding must be spent by September of 2024, however. We are exploring ways to maintain the services and programming implemented as a result of these dollars.

We are grateful for our community's support so that we can continue providing a top-notch education to the students of Liberty-Benton.




